"A copy of all documents (including but not limited to hard copy or electronic briefings, minutes, reports, emails, letters, meeting agendas, diary entries, event attendance records and any other correspondence) between Department of Primary Industries and Regions South Australia and the Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development (including directly with staff within the office of the Minister for Primary Industries), relating to electronic identification."

Timeframe: 19/03/2022 to 19/08/2022

On 23 August 2022, contact was made with your office and it was clarified that your application refers to "electronic identification of sheep and/or goats".

Accordingly, the following determination has been finalised.

I have located five documents that are captured within the scope of your request.

The information removed pursuant to Clause 1(1)(e) would reveal detail of a matter for consideration in Cabinet.

Clause 5(1)(a)(i) states:

# "5—Documents affecting inter-governmental or local government relations

- (1) A document is an exempt document if it contains matter—
  - (a) the disclosure of which -
    - (i) could reasonably be expected to cause damage to intergovernmental relations; and
  - (b) the disclosure of which would, on balance, be contrary to the public interest."

The information removed pursuant to Clause 5(1)(a)(i) consists of detail relating to other jurisdictions.

In addressing the public interest test for the exemption, I have balanced the following factors:

In favour of the public interest:

- Meeting the objects of the Act favouring access to documents.
- Ensuring optimal use of public resources.
- High level of interest in the accountability of public office holders.
- The importance of transparency and openness and the interest that the public has in the decision-making processes of Government.

### Contrary to the public interest:

- The need to preserve confidentiality of information shared and provided by other jurisdictions in Australia.
- It is expected that release of this information would harm inter-governmental relationships with the other jurisdictions resulting in these agencies reconsidering their position regarding future data provision and discussions with the SA Government.
- The recent age of the information was considered and the continuing relevance of the matters.

Having considered the various factors weighing for and against disclosure, I have determined that disclosure of this information would, on balance, be contrary to the public interest.

The information removed from the above document is pursuant to Clause 6(1) of Schedule 1 of the Freedom of Information Act which states:

#### "6 - Documents affecting personal affairs

(1) A document is an exempt document if it contains matter the disclosure of which would involve the unreasonable disclosure of information concerning the personal affairs of any person (living or dead)."

The information removed consists of an email address. Following an internet search, the email address was not easily located.

Accordingly, it is considered that disclosure of this information would be an unreasonable intrusion into the privacy rights of the individual concerned.

On 10 June 2022, the President of Livestock SA, Mr Joe Keynes wrote to you with an update on the work on traceability in South Australia's sheep industry that Livestock SA will be undertaking with grant funding from the Red Meat and Wool Growth Program and the Sheep Industry Fund and seeking engagement from you and your staff into this work. Ministerial Comments -

#### Background

- Livestock SA realises that implementation of a national or state-based sheep electronic identification (eID) system is inevitable and supports continuous improvement of traceability for all livestock products for market access and farm management purposes.
- The South Australian Sheep Industry Blueprint 2030 targets the need for adoption of eID and data sharing covering 100% of stock processed to promote a responsive and resilient supply chain.
- In addition, recent industry discussions on biosecurity (Livestock SA Biosecurity Forum held 7 April 2022) focused on the need for product integrity for consumers as well as individual animal identification for disease incursion management.
- On 4 April, Livestock SA wrote to the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) requesting financial support to establish a Sheep Traceability Project (The Project) which would:
  - o Establish a Sheep Traceability Strategy Committee
  - Conduct state-wide consultation and develop a South Australian specific Business Case outlining the justifications for undertaking sheep eID in SA, which will evaluate the benefit, costs, and risks of this strategy
  - o Develop an implementation strategy for a sheep eID program in SA
  - Develop a communication, extension, and engagement strategy for the implementation of sheep eID in SA.
- A grant of \$140,000 was provided to Livestock SA from the Red Meat and Wool Growth Program towards this project. Additional funding was also provided from the Sheep Industry Fund.
- Mr Joe Keynes, President of Livestock SA wrote to you on 10 June 2022 providing an update on this work and seeking engagement from you and your staff into this work.

#### Discussion

- National peak industry bodies and other jurisdictions have been exploring options of eID implementation for many years, with activity in this area increasing significantly since Victoria introduced a sheep eID system in 2017.
- The National Biosecurity Committee has agreed in principle to support the introduction of individual electronic identification (eID) for sheep and goats in all jurisdictions.
- Over the last three years the Red Meat and Wool Growth Program has taken a
  proactive approach to the implementation of eID and has been working with
  producers and service providers to drive the uptake of eID and to promote the
  productivity and traceability benefits of this technology so that producers are already
  utilising it to its full potential when/if it becomes mandatory.
- This project will assist to inform industry and government decision making on mandatory eID adoption and ensure all aspects of implementation are considered across the supply chain prior to any decision being reached mandatory eID implementation.

- At least two representatives from the Department of Primary Industries and Regions will participate in the Sheep Treaceability Strategy Committee and report back to your office on progress of this work as it occurs over the next 12 months.
- A letter of response to Mr Joe Keynes, President of Livestock SA, has been prepared for your consideration.

The peak bodies - Sheep Producers Australia (SPA), Australian Meat Industry Council (AMIC) and Cattle Council Australia (CCA) have requested that you support the national traceability reform recommendations tabled at Agriculture Ministers' Meeting (AMM) recently. The peak bodies support whole-of-system traceability reform, including individual electronic identification (eID) of sheep and goats, investment in a database for all livestock, sustainable and equitable cost-sharing arrangements, and establishing a harmonised governance model.

### Background

- In May 2018, National Biosecurity Committee (NBC) requested advice from SAFEMEAT Advisory Group on reform opportunities to improve Australia's National Livestock Identification System (NLIS). The report Reform Recommendations for Australia's Livestock Traceability System was delivered to the National Biosecurity Committee (NBC) in March 2020.
- NBC established a working group, the National Livestock Traceability Enhancement Working Group (NLTEWG), in January 2021, consisting of representatives from Commonwealth, state and territory governments and Animal Health Australia to undertake scoping work on the available options to implement SAFEMEAT's traceability reform recommendations.
- The working group focused on two deliverables and a report was provided to NBC on:
  - Options for nationally consistent governance frameworks, including decision making and data management considerations, for national livestock traceability arrangements.
  - Securing NBC support for individual electronic identification (eID) for sheep and goats and work to develop a national implementation plan and associated costings. NBC supported this at the meeting in June 2022.
- The outbreaks of Lumpy Skin Disease (LSD) and Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) in Indonesia, and African Swine Fever in Europe and Asia has highlighted the increased risk of a disease incursion into Australia and the inadequacy of mob-based systems to trace, identify and locate animals of interest, to minimise industry impacts.

#### Discussion

- At the June 2022 meeting of NBC it noted that mob-based identification requirements for sheep and goats do not meet agreed national performance standards for traceability, and that introduction of individual electronic identification (eID) for sheep and goats will improve national traceability capability to:
  - 1. enable swifter and more targeted response to emergency animal disease (EAD) outbreaks or food safety emergencies
  - 2. support Australia's ability to maintain and develop market access with trading partners. This section should include an analysis of options, including relevant risk assessment and a recommended action(s).
- NBC supported the mandatory implementation of individual eID for sheep and goats, to commence in each jurisdiction in 2022 with staged delivery of full supply chain capability by 1 January 2025.
- NBC is in the process of establishing a Sheep and Goats Traceability Task Force (SGTTF) to provide oversight of a national implementation program and advice on funding arrangements, including a nationally co-funded implementation arrangement. This Task Force will collaborate and co-ordinate with a South Australian Steering Committee.

 The AMM unanimously supported the development of a national, industry-led mandatory sheep and goat electronic identification (eID) system at its meeting on 20 July 2022.

#### Stakeholder / regional impacts, consultation and engagement

- Livestock SA has been provided \$140,000 in funding through the Red Meat and Wool Growth Program to analyse the need for and benefits of the South Australian sheep industry moving to an eID system and develop an implementation strategy to transition the industry to this traceability system.
- Livestock SA will create a South Australian Sheep Traceability Strategy Committee to be led by Livestock SA and including two representatives from the South Australian Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA), to:
  - Conduct state-wide consultation and develop a South Australian specific Business Case outlining the justifications for undertaking sheep eID in SA, which will evaluate the benefit, costs, and risks of this strategy
  - o Develop an implementation strategy for a sheep eID program in SA
  - Develop a communication, extension, and engagement strategy for the implementation of sheep eID in SA.
- Each jurisdiction will need to prepare, in consultation with stakeholders, a jurisdictionappropriate implementation plan, incorporating nationally-agreed milestone dates for the National SGTTF.

#### Management of key risks

 PIRSA will have representation on both the National Sheep and Goats Traceability Task Force and the South Australian Sheep Traceability Strategy Committee.

Thank you for your letter of 20 July 2022 regarding a national traceability system for sheep on behalf of the Peak Industry Councils - Sheep Producers Australia (SPA), Australian Meat Industry Council (AMIC) and Cattle Council Australia (CCA).

The development of a national mandatory sheep and goat electronic identification system, in light of the serious threat of Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD), is a priority for State, Territory and the Commonwealth Governments.

At the meeting of Australian Agriculture Ministers on 20 July 2022, I am pleased to say, there was unanimous support for the development of a national, industry-led sheep and goat electronic identification (eID) system.

A national framework will be developed by federal and state agricultural departments with industry input for consideration at the next meeting of agriculture ministers.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regions SA (PIRSA) has provided funding to Livestock SA to analyse the benefits of an eID system to the South Australian sheep and goat industries and to develop an implementation strategy to transition the industry. This work will be conducted over the next year and will be used to inform industry and government decision making on mandatory eID adoption.

Livestock SA is currently in the process of forming a Sheep Traceability Steering Committee, which will include two PIRSA officers.



Thank you for your offer of assistance or briefings to discuss your position on the recommended reforms of Australia's traceability system.

Once again, thank you for writing to me. I look forward to monitoring the progress of the traceability reforms.
